Broadway: Laid out in the early 1800's by entrepreneur Gideon Putnam, Broadway connected the upper and lower villages. Over the years, Saratoga developed into the "Queen of the Spas," with Victorian designed grand hotels and buildings lining the street; many of which still remain today.



City Hall: Built in 1871, City Hall was originally crowned by a bell tower and a 6' four-sided clock. The building also housed the post office and an elegant two-story theatre. The American Banking Association and the American Bar Association were founded here. The Saratoga Music Hall, part of the revamped original theatre, is still in use today.

Information Booth: Open daily from mid-June through August, the booth, staffed by the Saratoga County Chamber of Commerce, sits just south of Spring Street on Broadway. Free maps, brochures, guides and other helpful visitor information are available.

Visitor Center and Heritage Area: Built in 1915, the Visitor Center, located at the corner of Congress St. and Broadway, opposite Congress Park, is on the National Register of Historic Places and features historic exhibits, free maps, guides, brochures, and the video "Discover Saratoga." Open year round, the Center offers gift items for sale and has handicap accessible public restrooms.

South Broadway: The high concentration of restaurants, hotels and motels, have been built to accommodate the year-round increase of visitors to Saratoga Springs. Visual improvements including streetscape landscaping, curbs and sidewalks and Victorian lamp posts have been recently added to enhance the area.

Historic Congress Park: Dating back to 1826, this is one of the oldest parks in the state. Pathways lead visitors through lush landscaping and attractions including the Spirit of Life memorial fountain, the Italian Gardens with the treasured tritons 'Spit and Spat,' two restored fish ponds, the War Memorial, and the beautiful historic Carousel. The Saratoga Springs History Museum is also located in the Park. 518-584-6920

Gideon Putnam Resort and Spa: This historic building, built in the elegant Georgian style, is a national landmark offering gracious accommodations and dining all year. 518-584-3000



SPAC: The Saratoga Performing Arts Center is the summer home to the New York City Ballet, Philadelphia Orchestra, Saratoga Jazz Festival and a variety of other concerts, ranging from classical music to pop and rock concerts. SPAC can accommodate 5,100 people inside and up to 35,000 on the lawn. SPAC information 518-587-3330



Spa State Park: Laid out in 1935, this scenic 2,100-acre park features the beloved 'Avenue of the Pines,' historic buildings, picnic areas, mineral springs, pools, tennis, golf, and walking trails. (Park Office: 518-584-2535) The Saratoga Automobile Museum, housed in the former bottling plant, is also located in the park. 518-587-1935

National Museum of Dance: A National Landmark, located in the former Washington Bath House, the Museum is the only one in the country devoted entirely to the history of dance. Attractions include rotating exhibits, the Mr. and Mrs. C.V. Whitney Hall of Fame, and the Lewis A. Swyer School of the Performing Arts. Tours are available for a small admission fee. 518-584-2225. CDTA's Trolley will provide service to and from the Museum on Tuesday-Sunday only. No Mondays- between the hours of 10:25am – 4:25pm.

Mineral Spas and Baths: The newly-renovated historic Roosevelt Baths is a part of the Gideon Putnam Resort and offers mineral baths and a wide range of spa amenities. Another spa option is the Crystal Spa, also along the trolley route. The Lincoln Bath House, now closed to the public, stands next to the Dance Museum and was built in the early 20th Century.

Saratoga Race Course: Named one of the "Top 10 Sporting Venues in The World" by Sports Illustrated, Saratoga Race Course is home to The Travers Stakes, America's "Mid-Summer Derby." The 40-day race meet starts in July and runs through Labor Day. Top horses, trainers and jockeys from around the world flock to Saratoga for this illustrious and historic meet. 


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A Brief History of Saratoga

Saratoga Springs with its Victorian architecture, rich history and world class cultural and entertainment venues has been honored over the years with the Inaugural Great American Place Award by American Heritage Magazine and the Distinctive Destination designation from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, along with numerous other lifestyle awards. Native Americans frequented mineral springs in the area for centuries before the arrival of settlers in the late 1700's. In 1802 Gideon Putnam, Saratoga's founding father, began to carve a resort out of the wilderness. His 70' long tavern, built at the corner of Broadway and Congress Street, was known in the late 1800's as the Grand Union Hotel, reputed to be the largest hotel in the world. The lure of the mineral springs, and the elegance of the summer season, aided by the advent of train travel in 1832, resulted in rapid growth. The area is still noted as one of the fastest growing in the state. Over the years, Saratoga Springs, the 'Queen of the Spas,' developed a worldwide reputation for Health, History and Horses. In spite of financial decline experienced during the midtwentieth century, a strong preservation movement was initiated in the 1970's. This movement saved many of the buildings from the city's Victorian heyday, maintaining much of the city's rich architectural legacy for future generations.

Today, the city offers visitors a variety of open vistas, heritage areas, and a vibrant downtown district. Cultural offerings at the nationally recognized Saratoga Performing Arts Center, various museums, and the Spa Little Theatre, along with great shopping, fine accommodations, horse racing, dining, and the lure of free concerts in Congress Park make Saratoga Springs the place to be!
